Revisiting the Italian Renaissance

February 5–March 26, 2011

The exhibition presents Italian Renaissance painting and sculpture, highlights from the Samuel H. Kress Collection of the Allentown Art Museum. It revisits the Renaissance—an age of piety, humanist recovery of the classical world, global exploration, trade between Europe and the East, and a new appreciation of art and its creators. The works demonstrate the development of Renaissance art from its origins in the fourteenth century through its culmination in the sixteenth century. From dramatic sacred narratives and pious images that magnified religious devotion to the worldly display of aristocrats and naval commanders in vibrant portraits, these splendid works reveal the rich visual culture of Renaissance Italy.
